

### What stage of caregiving am I in?

Stage 1: The Expectant Caregiver™	<ul> <li>In the near future, I may help a family member or friend.</li> <li>Feeling concerned about person needing assistance, based on person's age, medical condition(s), and/or living situation.</li> </ul>
Stage 2: The Freshman Caregiver™	<ul> <li>I'm beginning to help a family member or friend.</li> <li>Starting to assist person and learning about what caregiving tasks need to be done</li> </ul>
Stage 3: The Entrenched Caregiver™	<ul> <li>I am helping a family member or friend.</li> <li>Experiencing daily or constant involvement with caregiving</li> </ul>
Stage 4: The Pragmatic Caregiver™	<ul> <li>I am still helping a family member or friend.</li> <li>Approaching caregiving with a practical and realistic approach, caregiver has accepted the caregiving role</li> <li>Using community services to help person</li> </ul>
Stage 5: The Transitioning Caregiver™	<ul> <li>My role is changing.</li> <li>Caregiving as I know it is ending, because my person lives in a care facility.</li> </ul>
Life After Caregiving	<ul><li>My caregiving has ended.</li><li>Finding new meaning and purpose in life after caregiving</li></ul>
