The Expectant CaregiverTM

- Key word: Ask
- Prepare, research, gather information
- "In the near future, I may help a family member or friend"
- I am concerned but don't have a formal diagnosis



The Freshman CaregiverTM

- Key word: Find
- Find solutions; what works and what doesn't
- "I'm beginning to help a family member or friend"
- Early-stage dementia causing disease or mild cognitive impairment



The Entrenched CaregiverTM

- Key word: Receive
- Find the strength to continue
- Accept help and support
- "I am helping a family member or friend."
- Mild to moderate dementia symptoms



The Pragmatic CaregiverTM

- Key word: Welcome
- Approach caregiving practically and realistically
- Welcome opportunities for connection and forgiveness
- "I am *still* helping a family member or friend."
- Moderate dementia symptoms



The Transitional CaregiverTM

- Key word: Allow
- Focus on your relationship with the person
- Supervise care
- "My role is changing."
- Severe or late-stage dementia symptoms



Life After CaregivingTM

- Key word: Treasure
- "My caregiving has ended."
- Finding new meaning and purpose in life after caregiving.
- Integrate your former role as a caregiver into your life going forward.
