LETTER FROM CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

As I look back and reflect on 2023, I started thinking about an article that I read that described filial piety. The article focused on how different cultures take care of and respect the older adults in their communities. It is simply ingrained as part of their way of culture. What struck me as I read, was not the challenges that older adults face in our own community, but how AGE of Central Texas fully lives in the heart of what filial piety represents. In other words, we walk the talk day in and day out as a thought leader, through our programs of direct support, through the care our staff demonstrates as they interact with those reaching out for support, and through our Board of Directors, who sets the vision for our organization. I am so proud to be a part of this amazing team.

In 2023, we continued our quest to open our facility in far South Austin. The year was filled with tours that helped folks see the vision of what the building will represent to older adults and caregivers living in South Central Texas. We are on track to complete construction in March of 2024, and I cannot wait to share more about the building in our 2024 Impact Report! In addition to building our new South Austin facility, and continuing our six programs of direct support, we launched other programs and initiatives such as partnering with the Clayton, Rameriz & Null Law firm to host three free Estate Planning Clinics for low-income older adults and their families. These clinics helped these individuals to become more financially and emotionally secure.

We held ongoing support groups for caregivers that helped stabilize their mental health and provided a community of encouragement. We participated in training police, fire, and EMS first responders to help them become equipped to understand how to work with the older adults they encounter and we will continue to do so. We also ran our very first Public Service Announcement in organizational history, and it was a moment of pride to see our organization highlighted on television.

Our impact numbers will reflect a year where we stabilized, we grew, we thrived, and we continued to meet each person who reaches out to us where they are in their aging or caregiving journey. This has been such a year of anticipation and excitement for what will come with our expansion South, but we also stayed grounded in service. AGE is most definitely something special.

AGE PROGRAMS

Thrive Social & Wellness Centers: Providing vibrant daytime care for older adults with physical or cognitive needs in the longest-operating licensed, non-residential Day Activity and Health Service Centers in Central Texas

Information & Resource Center: Offering free resource navigation assistance, educational conferences, seminars, and support groups for older adults and family caregivers.

CaregiverU: Evidence-based training, education, and support for non-professional family caregivers.

Health Equipment Lending Program (HELP): Free, gently used durable medical equipment loans and hygiene products for low-income older adults.

Memory Connections: A comprehensive online support program for older adults experiencing mild or early-stage cognitive changes, where participants take a proactive approach to maintaining their quality of life, with access to Central Texas' only source for Cognitive Stimulation Therapy.

Technology Learning Lab: Technology education designed to empower older adults to utilize technology independently and to deepen their skills through social connection.




